

### READ ALL ABOUT IT


For those of you who are always on the look-out for new things to read about Vizslas, dogs and field trialing, there are two new publications worth checking into.

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### FIELD TRIALER'S PERSPECTIVE

The Vizsla Club of America Nationals are coming to Nebraska this fall. A field trial champion contender needs consistency, intensity and an errorless performance for not one but two half-hour heats.

Consistency in ground race and bird-work are essential. A realistic contender routinely demonstrates a solid ground race with hunting intensity and few, if any, "flat spots". He likes to "dig in" rather than "lope along" in seeking objectives. His hunting desire is never in question. A realistic contender will demonstrate these ground race traits for at least six weeks prior to the championship stakes.

Bird-work consistency includes stop-to-flush, pointing intensity, no steps during the flush, a minimal move-to-mark (if necessary), and an acceptable retrieve, all with zero commands issued (except, perhaps, fetch). A realistic contender will demonstrate over 90% success for these birdwork characteristics for at least three weeks prior to a championship stake.

The Vizsla Club of Illinois has nine <u>potential</u> contenders for a National Championship, based on selected performances in the past season. Unfortunately, none of these dogs would have been realistic National Champion contenders this past fall, based on the consistency aspect (please, no disrespect intended).

We need to start molding our dogs into championship contenders NOW. Let's resolve to measure each Gun Dog performance from our dogs against a championship standard; to allow our dogs only five minutes to rectify a mediocre ground race; to instantly correct our dogs for errors; and to eliminate commands that detract from our dogs' performances. Let's sacrifice Gun Dog placements, if necessary, to shape our dogs into National Champions. Let's set strategies, conditioning plans, and milestones for our dogs to obtain the championship performance goals. And finally, let's show the professional handlers that they DON'T have a monopol on National Champions!



### Orphan Puppy

On September 28th we had to have a C-Section on one of bitches. This is the first time in over 20 year of breeding Min Pins that any of our bitches has failed to whelp naturally. Three of the four puppies were dead and the bitch did not survive the surgery. It was heartbreaking to lose a young champion daughter of Captain, our Multi Best in Show dog and we were determined that the remaining bitch puppy would survive. This was our first attempt to raise an orphan. We have supplemented puppies in the past but have never had to raise a puppy whose mother died at birth. Our vet recommended that we not use one of the prepared puppy formulas such as Esbilac. Instead he had us mix our own formula and I will never again use anything else. This pup never tasted he mother's milk but grew and thrived as well as any naturally fed puppy that we have ever had. The formula is easy to make and contains ingredients that are readily available.

Hix together with egg beater or in blender:

7 ounces milk

1 ounce light cream

1 egg yolk

2 tablespoons water

2 tablespoons light Karo syrup

I That's all there is to it. The formula keeps as well as milk in the refrigerator. One batch was enough for about the first week for the one puppy. By the end of the third week she was finishing off a batch in about 3 days. We used a regular puppy nursing bottle and warmed the formula (in the bottle) in the microwave. It took about 10 - 15 seconds to warm it. I kept her box and heating pad next to my bed for the first few nights so that I would wake if she started crying. The first night she was fed every 2 hours. The second night she only woke me once. From the third night on she slept thru the night without being sed. Try this formula the next time you need to bottle feed a puppy. We think you'll be pleased. Incidently, since she received no immunity from the mother's colostrum, we kept her completely isolated from the other dogs. At 3 weeks of age we gave her a half dose shot of modified live DILL/Parvo vaccine followed by a full dose at 5 weeks. Oh yes -the puppy's name? Onlyone Orphan Annie, of course.

## Pitter Patter

# (A Preservative)

About three years ago, many pet food manufacturers began to increase the fat content of dog and cat food. Increasing the fat content of pet food shortens the shelf life of both wet and dry pet, foods, so the manufacturers began to look for an effective, inexpensive preservative to <u>increase</u> the shelf life of those foods for up to two years. Some vitamins (C & E) could have been added as an antioxidant to preserve the fat content, but they are relatively expensive and do not enjoy a notably long shelf life. Many of the manufacturers began to add ETHEXYQUIN to both dry and wet pet foods to do the Job. However, the addition of ETHOXYQUIN to both dry and wet pet foods has caused some concern among pet owners.

ETHOXIONIN, an inexpensive, artificial preservative, is a synthetic chemical formulated in 1955 by Nonsanto as a rubber stabilizer. Ethoxyquin has been approved for use as both a herbicide and insecticide. (It kills both weeds and insects). It has also been approved for use in animal feeds, especially in feeds for short-lived animals (chicken, cattle, etc.) which are intended for human consumption. Subsequently it was approved for use in pet foods. It has not been approved for general use in human foods although it is currently used in cayenne, paprika, and shortening (without being listed on any labels when added to these human foods).

Hawley's Condensed Chemical Dictionary states that ETHOXYOUIN is "toxic by ingestion." Its toxicity rating is 3. According to llawley's, the preservative is a skin irritant and may produce reversible liver changes. 150 parts per million is a proportion that is apparently considered reasonable when it is used as an additive.

The FOA's Center for Food Safety and Applied Nutrition (CFSAC), in 1982 concluded that the oral acute toxicity data, although insufficiently detailed, indicated that ENOXYOUN is <u>slightly</u> toxic to animals. According to James Corbin of the University of Illinois College of Agriculture, the <u>most sensitive species to develop ENOXYOUIN-induced pathological changes</u> is dogs.

Unfortunately, the amount of EHOXYQUIN actually present in pet food apparently increases when one adds up all the products that go into pet food. Chickens and cattle, etc. absorb any ETHOXYQUIN in THEIR feed, storing any excess in their livers. When the pet food manufacturers use chicken and meat by-products, any excess EI-DXYQUIN in those by-products, added to the ETHOXYQUIN which may have been added to the grains or fats, etc. before they come to the dog food company, combined with the ETHOXYQUIN added to the pet food by the pet food manufacturers may add up to more than the "safe" 150 parts per million. ("NOIE: if ETHOXYQUIN is in the ingredients before coming to the dog food company, it does not have to be listed in the contents on the side of the bag or can.) When one adds all these combinations up, the result is that any dog who is sensitive to toxic additives may find its immune system under attack when its kidneys and liver can no longer detoxify efficiently. Some dogs have been known to bleed from the nose and gums, some develop mange, and some breeders have been plagued with breeding problems (reduced sperm counts, missed or delayed seasons, deformed puppies).

Now for the good news! Those breeders who found their dogs developing health problems after ETHOXYQUIN was added to their normal dog foods and who subsequently <u>switched</u> to dog foods that do NOI contain ETHOXYQUIN discovered that the conditions cleared up within 3 days to six weeks! (R:member Hawley's said the condition was a reversible liver change!)

We dog owner do not have the laboratory facilities to fully conduct unbiased studies of the result of adding EIHOXYQUIN to pet foods. However, changing to dog foods which do NOI contain EIHOXYQUIN has seemed to reverse the problems noted when feeding dogs pet foods containing the preservative. Thus, it may be wise to AVOID using ANY kind of dog food (canned, dry, dog treats, or whatever) that lists EIHOXYQUIN on the label.

ED NOTE: Lately there has been a controversy in "dog circles" regarding Ethoxyquin in dog food. Thanks to Gwen Tomlinson for passing this article along. The major premium dog food brands I have checked labels on all seem to be using it. If anyone knows more on this subject, I'd be interested to hear about it.


