It has been confirmed that in our area (Hanover Park) the Black Nightshade weed has killed 3 dogs.

The plant grows wild, usually near a fence and has a maple like leaf with a star shaped flower producing a yellow pod-like center. As the plant grows it bears green berries which are also toxic to children. When the berries ripen to purple they are edible. Symptons that an animal may have, when he has eaten the Black Fightshade are; nausea, dilation of the pupils, hyperactivity, rapid

breathing, come, paralysis and then death. An Animal may be saved if attended immediately.

This plant is more prevalent in Europe, but the american variety is a dwarf type which grows wild in Illinois. (This information comes from our advisor paper of 8/3/72)

Its Reliability for the Detection of Hip Dysplasia in Young Dogs. By Sally & James Venerable,

There have been many claimes that palpation of young puppies by a trained veterinarian can successfully predict the hip status of the dogs when they mature. Since early knowledge of hip condition would be of great assistance in the selection of puppies, we have been most anxious to learn how much reliance can be put on the palpation predictions. We now have a preliminary answer to this question obtained from a single litter palpated at 4.5 weeks and later evaluated radiographically by the OFA. Other breeders will be interested in comparing the results obtained by the two methods.

The litter was whelped on Dec.23, 1968. Both Sire and Dam were OFA normal. The hip status of

the parents and siblings of the sire were not known but some of his close relatives are known to have been dysplastic. The sire of the dam was a strong normal and her dam was dysplastic as determined by the GRCA dysplasia counsil. Thus we expected that this litter would be mixed with respect to hip dysplasia.

The pups were tatooed in the right ear for identification purposes when 12 days of age. When 4.5 weeks old they were taken to Lowell, Indiana, and palpated by Dr. John Bardens. Each pup was anesthetized and both the palpation and abduction techniques were used. The examinations were witnessed by one of the authors and two friends. The results of the examinations are given in Table 1.

It may be of interest that pup no.4 was nalpated but the diagnosis was changed to grade 1 dysplasia when he was placed under deeper anesthesia.

These dogs were sold with the provision that they would be A-rayed when mature and the films submitted to the OFA. The OFA reports on 6 of the 7 dogs are now available and are shown in Table 1.

The correlation between the palpation predictions and the radiological evaluations is disappointing. The palpation methods not only failed to predict whether or not a given dog would be dysplastic but, nore disappointing, failed to place the pups in their relative order of hip strenght.

Reliance on palpation could be very misleading. For example, dog no 7. might have been discarded on the basis of the palpation examination. Radiographically, he now has the best set of hips in the entire

litter. Some people are using the palpation predictions as a reason for having the pectineus muscle cut. Had dog number 7 been given this operation he now could be cited as evidence supporting the value of this procedure.

Careful selection of the best puppies from each generation for use as breeding stock is essential to a good breeding program. Unfortunately few breeders have the means for keeping entire litters until mature qualities of the dogs become apparent. Most puppies must be selected when they are only 7 to 12 weeks of age. An accurate diagnosis of the hip status of such dogs would be extremely helpful. A procedure that could only indicate the relative strenght of the dogs within a litter would be quite useful.

Several years ago the authors had a litter of 10 puppies X-rayed at 4 weeks of age and the radiographs sent to Dr. T. J. Hage, University of Cal. at Davis, for his evaluation. His predictions corresponded very well with the OFA evaluations when the dogs were mature. Unfortunately, a careful paired-study performed by some of Dr. Hage's colleagues after his death failed to support the merit of his evalustion procedure. Prior to this experience, the authors had kept entire litters until they could be A-rayed at 7 to 8 months of age. Dr. Hage's predictions at that age did not correlate very well with the GRCA Councils evaluations when the dogs were more than a year of age. (Dr. Hage was a member of the GRCA Dysplastic Council). However, his evaluations did enable us to keep the strongest titch from each litter and by breeding only to GRCA normal sires we obtained normal pups in the third generation.

While our information is based on a very limited number of dogs, we must conclude that there is not yet a satisfactory technique for selecting dysplastic-free puppies. It is possible that there have been improvements in the palpation techniques during the past three years. At this time, however, we believe that careful selection of the sire and dam for a depth of normal dogs in their pedigrees is still the test protection for the breeder and for the puppy buyer that their mature dogs will not have this disabling disease.

Dr. I. S. Larsen, Project Director for the OFA, is currently collecting data on palpation. It will be a helpful service to dog breeders and the veterinarian profession if breeders who have information on palpated litters will send the particulars to Dr. Larsen, Orthropedic Foundation for Animals, University of Missouri Columbia, 817 Virginia Ave. Columbia, Missouri 65201

* KEEPING PUPPY OUT OF TROUBLE *

It was one of those TV talk shows, and the guest was giving advice on how to keep a new puppy happy and, hopefully quiet. The puppy was in a baby's wooden play pen, and old bath rug on the floor, and he was given a large bone, a half-full hot water bottle, a small alarm clock and a radio.

The guest explained that the hot water tottle would remind him of his mothers warmth, the alarm clocks ticking would seem like her heartbeat, and the radio would keep him company.

This puppy was one of a large breed, and while he was only 8 or 9 weeks old, he was big enough to get his head caught between the hars of the playpen. Or failing that, he could chew on wood, which would splinter.

The hot water bottle, half full, would be a

cinch for him to chew into small bits and then swallow the pieces. The alarm clock might be harder to break apart, but it was small enough so he could pick it up in his mouth. One good drop could break the glass.

But the radio! If he chewed the electric cord, he could be electrocuted! No mention was made using a transistor radio, but even that could be dangerous if broke it open. A radio is fine to keep a puppy from feeling lonely, but MOT inside the playpen, or any other place he can get to it.

I GASPLD TO think of the millions of people watching that show who might accept these suggestions without thinking twice. After all, the guest was a well known dog trainer.

Young puppies, like any infant, must be protected from trouble. Because they're mobile, they require constant supervision when they are running free in the house

By the time they're 6 months old, they should have learned the meaning of "NO" and what they may and may not chew on. But until that time they must be confined for their own protection, and it should be in a place where they can't get into trouble.

a CRATE is the best answer, or a playpen, if it's properly fixed so they can't get caught in the bars or chew them. Failing these, a bathroom is usually the best place. There isn't much they can get into, provided you close the toilet lid.

Lend poisoning is a very real problem in dogs, so a kitchen with painted cabinets or furniture is a poor thoice. He should have hard beef bones and chew stickes. Any toys should be large enough so he can't swallow them, and hard enough so he can't chew them up.

Plastic dishes, wicker-basket beds, squeaker toys of soft rubber or plastic are all potentially dangerous, and he can get into enough trouble without being handed any extras to experiment on.
